Endemic Date:

Collect dried Akala berries, seeds will be hard. Soak in water for 10-15 min. then plant in well drained soil. Akala does well from cuttings. Soak stem in water then dip in root tone and plant.


---

Berries are edible, a little sour, used in jams and pies. Dark Dye was made from the fruit, pink dye was made from the flowers. Ashes from the burnt Akala were used for scaly scalps, heartburn and vomiting.

## A'alii'i

  
 Cut along dotted lines except inside lines

Indigenous Date:

Open the dried, brown "flower" seed pod to reveal tiny black seeds. Plant seeds in well drained soil, keep moist, and in partial shade.

---

Fruit were woven with fern into a lei po'o. the bright red capsules were boiled in calabashes until a red dye was produced, and used to dye kappa. Larger branches were used for building timbers and weapons. The leaves were crushed and used for rashes and itching.
